

In 2006

- There were more fatalities in any year since 1990 (27 fatalities), the second worst year since 1983 (25 fatalities).
- In accidents in which PFD use was a factor, only two victims were wearing a life jacket.
- Seventeen of the victims *may* still be with us today if they had worn a PFD at the time of the mishap that resulted in their death.
- Eight of the 25 victims were onboard unpowered boats. Seventeen were onboard powerboats.
- Thirteen fatalities occurred on rivers, seven on lakes, three on Lake Erie, and two on ponds.
- Nine of the victims died when their boats capsized, six fell overboard, and one was in a boat that swamped.
- Seven died in collisions, and 2 when their boat went over a dam.
- Hypothermia or sudden immersion into cold water was a possible factor in seven fatalities.
- Alcohol was a possible contributing factor in 14, one of the worst years ever in Pennsylvania.
- Twenty-three of the 25 victims were male; eight of the victims were anglers; 8 were paddling a canoe or kayak or rowing a boat.
- Fourteen of the 25 victims were known to be able to swim.
- Two of the victims were less than 18 years old; six were over 50.
- The average age of the victims in 2006 and 2005 was 38 years.
- Three of the boat operators involved in the fatal accidents had taken a boating course.
- The month of June accounted for seven fatalities; July had six; May followed with three. February, April, August, and September each had two. November had one, and there were no fatalities in January, March, October, and December.
- Fifteen of the fatal accidents happened in the afternoon, four in the morning. Five happened after dark.
- Fatalities occurred on six different weekdays. Saturday had the most with nine. Friday and Sunday followed with five each; three happened on Monday; Thursday had two. Only one occurred on a Tuesday with none on Wednesdays.

Of the 66 reported accidents, 17 were collisions, 10 of which were collisions between vessels

The types of reported accidents were as follows:

Falls overboard 17 Hit by propeller 3
Capsizing 16 Skier mishap 3

Collision with vessel 10 Other 2

Collision with fixed object 6 Fall within boat 2 Swamping/flooding 4 Fire/explosion 2

Hit by propeller 3 Collision w/ floating object 1

Personal watercraft (PWC) were involved in eight accidents in 2006, seven fewer than in 2005. Seven of the accidents involving PWCs were collisions, accounting for 41 percent of the total number of collisions for all boats. Eleven injuries were reported in accidents involving PWC. For the second year in a row, PWC operators or passengers were fatally injured (see recap #9). This was a double fatality involving a collision with another boat.

Nineteen fatal recreational boating accidents resulted in 25 fatalities. This is 13 more fatalities than the number that was reported in 2005 and the worst year since 1990. Only four of the 25 victims were wearing personal flotation devices at the time of the mishap that resulted in their deaths. Two of those victims were killed in one accident by blunt force trauma, so PFD use was not a factor in that accident. Six of the victims had wearable PFDs onboard the boat but did not wear them, and in five fatalities there were no PFDs onboard. In three accidents involving six fatalities, the use of PFDs was not applicable, and in three accidents involving five fatalities insufficient PFDs were onboard. The 25 fatalities in 2006 were nearly double the average for the last 10 years (13.2). Chance is always a factor in the number of recreational boating fatalities, and

2006 was a terrible year. The attached "Recap of 2006 Pennsylvania Boating Fatalities" illustrates the importance of safe boating practices. It provides a summary of all fatal recreational boating accidents in the Commonwealth last year. The recap's last page details statistical information about 2006's fatal boating accidents. The following are some highlights from that statistical information.

Lastly, we have a Boating Course scheduled for 19 May 2007 at the Beach Club Marina. Let's try to promote this and also try to find some people who we think will benefit by taking it. I'm sure Jim Stark will also need much help the day of the class. Please contact Jim and put it on your calendars to help out that day.

The Commander's Report

Boating Season is finally here!! It looks and feels like November, yet I have to remind myself that it's really April. I hope by the time you get this, we'll get to see the sun and feel the temperature rise.

I am sure all of you are aware of the upcoming National Safe Boating Week that runs from May 19th through the 26th, 2007. It serves to kick off this year's drive for safety on the water. If you are looking for a way to become involved in the Pittsburgh area drive for safe boating, the Pittsburgh Safe Boating Council will conduct the 13th Annual Blessing of the Fleet on May 26th. There will be clergy there from various denominations who will bless all of the boats and their crew who are present. Included in the ceremony is a helicopter which will drop a wreath into the water to commemorate all who have lost their lives in Pittsburgh area waters. There is a free lunch for everyone provided on Captain George Boyle's boat, the coordinator of the Blessing of the Fleet. If you plan on attending, give him a call at 412-371-7682 to let him know you will be joining him.

As members of the United States Power Squadron, we should take every opportunity to encourage safe boating around us. Dan Martin, Boating Safety Education Manager of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, reports the total number of recreational boating accidents in Pennsylvania decreased last year. There were 77 vessels involved in accidents, 65 injuries requiring medical treatment and property damage to vessels totaled \$137,438. This amount is less than half of what was reported for 2005. However, in 2006 there were 25 fatalities as the result of 19 recreational boating accidents. This is an increase of 13 deaths over last year's total. 2006's death toll has been the worst since 1990.

Looking at these statistics, we must ask ourselves how many of these accidents could have been prevented. In accidents in which Personal Safety Devices were involved, out of 19 fatalities, only 2 victims were wearing life jackets. It is possible that 17 of those victims could be planning their boating season this year had they worn a PFD. It's that simple. Make your mission as a Squadron Member to ensure the well being of you, your crew and those boating around you by talking about safety in your marina. Put up a sign advertising Vessel Safety Checks and let people know about our Safe Boating Classes.

The following (text only) is an excerpt from an article from April in BoatTest.com which advocated taking a USPS boating course.

cruiser, sailing enthusiasts, (PWC) operators, hunters or fishermen operating an outboard utility boat, and canoe and kayak paddlers.








Figure 9.14: Basic spring lines manoeuver and making use of a current

2006 PENNSYLVANIA BOATING ACCIDENT ANALYSIS

The total number of reported recreational boating accidents in Pennsylvania declined slightly in 2006. Boaters and officers reported only 66 recreational boating accidents of all types, a decrease of six accidents from 2005. The number of vessels involved in reported accidents totaled 77, an incredibly low total. Pennsylvania boaters reported 65 injuries requiring medical treatment, the same number as in 2005. Property damage to vessels totaled \$137,438, less than half of what was reported last year. Most accidents with property damage or minor injuries are not reported.





Education Department Report
